Shrewsbury School is a place the Mayor visits annually to recognise the long standing relation between the town and the school and this year it was a lovely surprise to be hosted in their latest building The Quad. As the school has developed there has always been a huge commitment to ensuring the best design standards are maintained using local architects and builders and is respectful in its prominent location looking over the town centre.


Shrewsbury Flaxmill Maltings – Over 220 years ago the last bricks were laid on an extraordinary building which would change the skyline of Shrewsbury for many generations to come. For much of the last decade the Flaxmill has been shrouded in scaffolding to protect its decaying façade from the elements. With the scaffolding gone, the external landscaping taking shaping and the potential for new occupiers to the building, this Phoenix is rising from the ashes and it takes its place again on the skyline of Shrewsbury.

The Churches Conservation Trust - For many years one of the jewels in the Churches Conservation Trust's crown has been St Mary's Church; one of the most visited churches in its portfolio. We are all biased as we know how beautiful it is but maintaining such a fine Grade I listed building with some of the most beautiful stain

glass windows in the country comes at a cost and a commitment to fine preservation. This last year has seen major investment in the roof and whilst not many of us have the opportunity of seeing it, rest assured the work has been done to exacting standards. With further plans to preserve the stain glass windows we can be assured that St Mary's stays in safe hands.

He started in the business as a boy washing caravans and over the last decade been instrumental in developing Love Plants, a plant centre with a difference as well as Love2Stay an exclusive touring and glamping resort bringing in some £3m of spend in the local economy. But it is not just his business he has a passion for having been a Director of

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Omega, the National Association for End of Life Care – This charity is a great example of an organisation embracing its commitment to the climate emergency. With their primary focus on supporting people with life limiting illnesses, Omega recycle old phones to help their volunteers make regular calls to their lonely clients and upload old iPads with speech synthesising equipment for people suffering from Motor Neuron Disease. With a whole raft of recycling to support their fundraising efforts together with their recent purchase of courier bikes for their deliveries to their clients they are at the forefront of being climate conscious.

Shropshire Cycle Hub - This Shrewsbury based charity has grown significantly since it was established just over 2 years ago. Not only has it looked to recondition old bikes and find them new owners, but it has been instrumental in developing the Shrewsbury Rickshaw, a free transportation service in the town centre. The big message of this charity is improving access to healthy sustainable transport across Shropshire encouraging the public at large to think about different solutions to just getting the car out, but also being an advocate in changing the county's thinking about active travel.

Dave Mellor - Dave is synonymous with cycling in Shrewsbury not only via his long

established shop in Frankwell but via the Mid-Shropshire Wheelers cycling club and the cycle track at the Shrewsbury Sports Village. Of late he has begun to diversify into more utility cycles and e-bikes which is evident by the number seen around the town helping people to make more journeys actively and ultimately reducing everyone's carbon footprint and addressing the climate emergency we find ourselves in.

Save our Shropshire



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Robert Bland DL – This year has seen the national Queens Green Canopy campaign designed at encouraging us all, residents, community groups, businesses, councils and schools to plant a tree in recognition of the Queens Platinum Jubilee. Once the tree is planted it needs to be logged on the national map and at the end of the year the map will be presented to Her Majesty to show how many trees have been planted in her honour. In Shropshire Robert Bland has been tasked by the Shropshire Lord Lieutenant to promote the campaign locally and he has been busy engaging with people locally to plant trees. Every tree also means the potential to sequestrate carbon from the atmosphere and create a cleaner and carbon free environment so a project with two very important aims.

The Shrewsbury Cup - The brain child of Sophie Peach and Alison Thomas, the Shrewsbury Cup was born out of their collective resolve to reduce the 150,000 single coffee cups used in Shrewsbury every year. Using a Shrewsbury Cup 3 times has less of an environmental impact than a single use cup. After 7 uses, it's 41% less and after 6 months use the impact is 95% less. Quite startling figures. So successful has the Shrewsbury Cup been that many places across the country have borrowed this Shrewsbury initiative with pride and are making significant inroads in reducing their carbon footprint.

Zero Carbon Shropshire - Launched in August 2020, Zero Carbon Shropshire is a not-for-profit organisation set up to ensure the county reaches zero carbon by 2030. Both Shropshire and Telford & Wrekin Council together with Parish Councils, the University, the BID, the hospital trust, Environment Agency and Severn Trent, the Wildlife Trust, Food Hub and many more have engaged in developing county plans to reduce our collective carbon footprint and the development of various themed working groups will make this happen.

Save Our Shropshire - Whilst Zero Carbon Shropshire has the action plan for achieving Zero Carbon by 2030, Save our Shropshire has a similar aim but to educate us all on how we can play our part. Every single one of us has a carbon footprint and we all need to do our bit to collectively reduce the county's footprint. But to do this we need community champions to spread that message. Over the last year Save our Shropshire has run Carbon Literacy Courses to help others to advocate the actions needed. Four of our Town Councillors as well as myself and our Deputy have done the course as has the whole of Shropshire Council's Cabinet members and Senior Managers, showing the value of such a course.

Lindsay Kelly – With many dance classes closing their doors during Lockdown, Lindsay took the innovative approach of supporting the community with free online dance classes through her Facebook Page, supporting individuals and families. Thankfully classes have returned to the dance studio with many having felt supported in recent challenging times, enjoying some sense of normality.

Chris Wood – Chris has been a Committee Member of the Shrewsbury Anglers Club for a number of years and has given his time freely to develop the club and support angling in Shrewsbury, offering experience of the sport to both young and old.

Julie McLoughlin – Julie has worked for Citizens Advice in Shrewsbury for 19 years supporting some of the most vulnerable in our society, signposting them to areas of support, helping them through emotional life episodes and at a time when COVID has brought huge challenges in our lives.

Joanna Purslow – Throughout Lockdown, Joanna has been a lynchpin in organising food parcels to families associated with Martin Wilson School and she worked closely with the Shrewsbury Food Hub to set up a Community Food Share in the areas. Most recently she has set up BabyStop, a share scheme to support families with children under 5s collecting and distributing second-hand clothes and baby

equipment. (Joanna couldn't be with us tonight, but we believe there is somebody here to represent her)

Wilfred Overton – This nominee of a Community Award is 90 years young and has been unstinting in his charity work since 1947. Helping in the local Youth Club, being a member of the old Shropshire Youth Committee, an active member of the British Legion and a county Standard Bearer for many years, of late he has been an inspirational member of the Shrewsbury Hard of Hearing Group. (Unfortunately, Wilfred is unable to join us this evening)

David Burns – David set up the Shropshire People Helping One Another Facebook Page that has helped hundreds of people connect together, offer support and share unwanted items with others. David is also famous for his fundraising scheme to raise money to purchase slow cookers for people struggling to feed themselves.

Richard Roberts – Richard has been a regular supporter of the Armed Forces Outreach since it was started in 2019, meeting, greeting and buddying up with those accessing the service. A veteran himself, he regularly attends the Shrewsbury Armed Forces & Veterans Breakfast Club, the Men Walking & Talking Group, volunteers for the Shropshire Poppy Appeal and is part of the Royal British Legion Mass Events National Team.

Clive Ireland – Clive is the Chair of Shropshire Mental Health Support, negotiating on

new services, liaising with commissioners of services and securing the future of the charity. Under his tenure the Shropshire Sanctuary was formed and has supported 793 visitors in the last year alone; the Calmer Café has provided 1027 hour of support in its first 9 months; the Emergency Department Service has seen 77 referrals from A&E and the Trauma Risk Management Service has held 120 sessions. Clive's latest project is to purchase a Wellbeing Bus to get to those hard to reach places, putting the improvement of mental well-being in Shropshire firmly at the heart of what he does.

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Shropshire Mental Health Support Staff & Volunteers – who could have ever envisaged what the COVID Pandemic could do to people’s mental well-being. Thankfully Shropshire Mental Health Support operated quickly and were able to provide phone support and in the first 3 months of lockdown 2000 were logged. Today they support 107 people, 71% of which were unknown to the service before COVID. With a broad range of support from the Sanctuary, Calmer Café, Bereavement & Sudden Death Support, Trauma Risk Management Service and the Outreach Support Worker Service, services reflect the needs of our community.

Nadine Brooks, Amy Norris & Leanne Francis – Nadine, Amy and Leanne are residents of Harlescott Grange and have worked tirelessly over the last 2 years to re-open the Harlescott Grange Community Hub which had fallen into disrepair. They have been unrelenting in seeking funding and support to revitalise the centre to what it should be, the heart of the community.

Claire Purcell – Claire is the Community Fundraiser for Omega promoting the work of the charity developing engaging initiatives to raise funds for the charity’s work and organising valuable projects for the charity, the most recent of which has been A Postcard from the Past in which elderly people receive handwritten postcards designed to stir their nostalgia and give them a sense of connection to the outside world.

Peter Bond – Peter has been a volunteer for Omega since 2014, raising awareness of the charity and helping to raise much needed funds. During COVID he ran the A Letter from Louise penpal project designed to combat loneliness. He also leads Omega’s Peter’s Stamp Appeal. Despite having significant health issues of his own, he has never stopped supporting this local charity.

The Green Oak Foundation – This organisation contributes to the well-being of the town by providing affordable counselling services to many who wouldn’t otherwise be able to afford it, be it financially, or the time it takes to access NHS services. So many GP surgeries have referred patients recognising their needs to access support early.

Shropshire European Organisation – This local charity was set up by Kate Fejfer to support families who have relocated to the county from Eastern Europe. During lockdown the charity organised food parcels for residents in need and over the last few months, they have been instrumental in supporting the Ukrainian Crisis co-ordinating the collection of donations and arranging shipment to Eastern Europe.

Stan Sedman – A fellow Yorkshire man, Stan made Shrewsbury his home a long time ago and for many years was Mr Shrewsbury in Bloom. But for the last few years Stan has been tireless in educating us all on the past history of our wonderful town taking many of us on guided tours of Shrewsbury and all the proceeds go to worthwhile charities. Getting places on his guided walks isn't that easy as they are booked up within minutes of them being publicised on the Love of Shrewsbury Facebook Page, just underlying how much we all appreciate his contributions to the town.

Alex Jordan Holmes-Brown - Alex is a founder member of Shropshire Ethnic Minority Alliance, an organisation established to combat against the feeling of being minoritised and marginalised. Started in 2020 with a Borders & Belongings Conference just before COVID Lockdown in 2020, he worked tirelessly during the pandemic working with organisations like Shropshire Supports Refugees and Black Lives Matter Shrewsbury to raise a number of key social issues, he organised online

meetings to bring faiths together, he helped with consultation on the county Cultural Strategy. All initiatives to support a kinder and fairer society.

Salop Leisure Aftersales - The ethos of Salop Leisure has always been recognised for its high level of customer care to ensure that customers have a positive experience from the point of purchase to their first adventure in their touring caravan, motorhome, holiday home or luxury lodge. Mike Smith – Mike has been a volunteer with Omega for 10 years and has used his first class degree in Computer Science to run the Omega Fix It project supporting 200 clients. On top of this he has been active member of the Shrewsbury Town Centre Residents Association, the Shrewsbury Branch of the University of the 3rd Age, supported local residents with disabilities and conducted a number of public lectures. Someone who has truly immersed himself in Shrewsbury life.

Share Shrewsbury – Share was established to support everyone affected by addiction, living in and around Shrewsbury. Their aim is to create a visible presence in Shrewsbury, where they can start a conversation with people about addiction and recovery. They have set up and supported recovery groups for individuals in recovery, as well as their family and friends. They have been able to challenge the myths about addiction and to enable people to understand that addiction is a progressive, terminal disease, and that sufferers deserve the same services and sympathy that is given to those with other physical conditions.

The Prince Rupert Hotel - Back in Lockdown the Prince Rupert provided accommodation to 57 homeless people from around the county and for the owner Mike Matthews, this was a journey of understanding and appreciating the needs of some of the most complex and vulnerable individuals in our society. He was able to

give them the space to develop and help them get on the pathways to recovery, employment and no longer sleeping rough. This initiative achieved national profile for its care and compassion

Shrewsbury Angling Club – This club was established in 2016 and now has over 300 members who fish along 7 km of the River Severn. Committee Members have a can-do attitude and have undertaken much of the work themselves, developed a Volunteer Bailiff Service and created initiatives to encourage young people into the sport. All of this goes to promoting angling throughout Shrewsbury.

Thomas Matthews – Thomas runs Eco Eden Professional Services, a business specialising in tree services for both domestic and commercial customers in Shrewsbury. Being very environmentally conscious, all their waste is recycled to be used as compost or wood fuel. On top of this they have had a charitable focus by supporting the Raising Smiles Charity locally.

Nikki Park & Colene Adams – We are always appreciative of the volunteers who go about their community and Nikki and Colene are no different, going about the Sutton Farm area of town litter picking in all weathers keeping their bit of town clean and tidy

Audrey Menhinick - Audrey is Chair of the Shropshire Way Association, a recently revised long distance path embracing the most impressive scenery which attracts visitors throughout the country. The route starts and finishes in Shrewsbury and an

iconic sculpture of its emblem, the Buzzard, sits proudly by Kingsland Bridge. Audrey was instrumental in the publication of a guide book by Cicerone Books, widely distributed nationally. Audrey also project managed a major publication, '20 Walks in and around Shrewsbury which has sold over 8500 copies since 2012 and provide routes and points of interest to visitors and local residents. Walking is one of the most popular leisure activities and Audrey's passion has greatly assisted to put Shrewsbury on the map. Audrey is a long serving committee member of Shrewsbury Ramblers whose 400 plus members are well served by her commitment to walking, a membership whose friends and families, residents and visitors can enjoy the glorious countryside that is Shropshire with Shrewsbury at the centre

Aaron Brown – Aaron started with humble beginnings in 2011 setting up Birds Nest Café being recognised in the Market Traders Awards on a number of occasions and winning the Best Independent Coffee Shop Award in 2017. Like many fledgling businesses, Aaron expanded into the town centre first setting up Dough & Oil Restaurant and most recently Oil Bar. In a bid to create visitor numbers to the Castle Street area, Aaron developed Oil to the Fort, setting up a bar in the Castle Grounds attracting many visitors to Shrewsbury Castle.

Love2Stay Touring & Glamping Resort - Love2Stay resorts attracts over 600 overnight guests to the park at any one time and over 80,000 visitors to the county each year. The site overlooks the Shropshire countryside with impressive views of the Wrekin. It has a close relationship with many tourist companies like Sabrina Boat and Max Bikes. Since the pandemic Love2Stay has been marketed as a wellness destination through the facilities they offer on-site including the natural bio-top pool, fitness gym, yoga and Pilates classes. In the last two years there has been an increase in overnight stays from locals with SY and TF postcodes, travelling within a 30-mile radius to holiday locally, promoting them as 'tourists in their own town'.

The Soldiers of Shropshire Museum - This Regimental Museum houses the collections of the major county Regiments dating back some 3 centuries – these

being the King's Shropshire Light Infantry and its ancestors; the Shropshire Yeomanry; the Shropshire Royal Horse Artillery and the related county Militia, Volunteers and Territorials of Shropshire. Even today, these regiments' successors, the Rifles and the Royal Yeomanry continue to have affection for this museum as it plots their past. Always attracting tourists within the Castle this remains a go to place for anyone visiting the town.

Visit Shropshire - Visit Shropshire is the official Destination Management Organisation for promoting the whole of Shropshire as a visitor destination. This involves linking with visitor attractions, hotels, cafes and restaurants, keeping track on major events in the county and liaising with the wider tourism industry to promote our county. Visit Shropshire is also key to press engagement in national papers, sorting out press visits but also working with production companies to use the county as a film location. Much going on behind the scenes but all with one distinct ambition of putting the county and our county town on the map nationally and internationally

Geoff Hardy & Peter Roscoe - In the 30+ years that they have lived in Shrewsbury they have been at the forefront of numerous local initiatives, many aimed at supporting and championing the LGBT community, though they have also championed many other individuals and groups in need of support. Although perhaps principally known in Shrewsbury as champions for LGBT rights and issues, both have worked throughout their lives in caring and supportive professions. In 1990 Geoff was a founding partner at the Natural Health Centre, which was immensely innovative in providing safe alternatives to both mainstream and fringe therapies. He gave talks to various groups in Shrewsbury about alternative medicines, giving a very honest appraisal of the pros and cons and evidence bases for alternative treatments. After beginning as a social worker, Peter's career was in child protection/safeguarding children services as a lawyer for social services in Shropshire. In 1987 and again in 1992 Geoff stood as the Green Party candidate in national elections, not to win but to raise awareness of environmental issues long before they were mainstream. Geoff and Peter were both central to the founding of Shrewsbury Rainbow Film Festival, which since its inception in 2006 they have helped build into an internationally recognised event. On the international stage, Geoff contributed a chapter called "The shame of 'not being a man'" to a book 'Alternatives Beyond Psychiatry' - first book of its type to take a European wide perspective on this topic. Peter was the first chair of Fairness Respect Equality

Shropshire, set up to promote equality and diversity. He has also worked on a number of contributions to Shropshire Gay History Month. Whether involved in separate or joint ventures, Peter and Geoff are two people who absolutely live their values, and have supported many people through many mental and physical health crises, including opening up their home to those in dire need.
