UPDATE FROM COUNCILLOR ALAN MOSLEY, LEADER OF SHREWSBURY TOWN COUNCIL



I was delighted to join a wonderful turnout parading through the town on Saturday, March 5th before hearing testaments to the plight of Ukraine at a gathering in the Quarry.

There was a good number of Town Councillors present, including the Mayor and Deputy Mayor.

Earlier that week, I had called a meeting of all political group leaders to discuss how Shrewsbury Town Council should respond to the war in ways that reflected the anger and heart-breaking sympathy being felt throughout our town.

As expected, we were as one in expressing disgust and an overwhelming desire to show solidarity with the people of Ukraine and to offer humanitarian support especially for those seeking refuge in Shropshire.

Therefore, we have agreed to a statement which is signed by myself, David Vasmar, Alex Phillips and Julian Green and is copied below. We are also recommending that an initial sum of £25,000 be allocated to support these humanitarian efforts.

We have no doubt that the pledge and financial contribution will be endorsed by the Full Council and by residents throughout Shrewsbury.

SHREWSBURY TOWN COUNCIL'S STATEMENT ON UKRAINE

Like many local and regional authorities across Europe, we strongly condemn the ongoing, multiple attacks on the sovereign territory of Ukraine. On behalf of the residents of Shrewsbury we send our full support and solidarity to the Ukrainian people and to our peers in local and regional government. We deplore the catastrophe we see unfolding as the values of humanity, freedom and democracy that we all hold so dear are viciously attacked by the Russian Federation.

The escalation of violence, repeated bombings and attacks on Ukrainian cities and territories targeting vulnerable people are a serious threat to the preservation of peace and democracy in our society.

Locally, the Town Council will support local community groups and organisations here in Shrewsbury who are coordinating collections and deliveries to Ukraine and its neighbouring countries to support the people within Ukraine. We will also actively play our part in supporting any Ukrainians who find themselves seeking refuge in the United Kingdom and ultimately Shropshire and Shrewsbury.

We are fortunate in Shrewsbury to have such caring organisations who have made Shropshire a safe and caring haven for refugees and we will continue to support them however possible.

We are pledged to provide help however possible be it financial or, through the use of our Councillors, staff and assets. We will also seek to raise awareness and support for Ukraine through our media and networks to maintain that collective global pressure.

I bought my niece a sweatshirt for Christmas that said "Be Kind" and every time she wears it, my brother sends me a photo and it always make me smile.

At 6 years old, she understands what that means and hasn't become angered by life.

My Gran used to have a saying "Do as you would be done by" and would instil in me and my brother at a very early age, a level of respect and kindness in others and I hope 50 years later I still live up to her saying.

That aspect of respect and kindness for others this week has manifested itself both on a local scale but also on a huge international scale.

All of us have been affected by the tragic events in Ukraine, and it is so difficult to comprehend how Russia can inflict such pain and suffering on its neighbours. We have all watched the TV with a sense of helplessness as events unfold.

But locally, in such a short space of time, it has been so heartening to see how our community has begun to do its bit to support those individuals who have found themselves in such terrible circumstances.



I have spoken to such lovely people this week whose acts of kindness towards these people are immeasurable.

I don't think they have slept all week co-ordinating collections and deliveries of medical supplies and clothes to be shipped off to Ukraine and its neighbouring countries to support such suffering.

It makes me hugely proud that there are some wonderful people in Shrewsbury with very big kind hearts and I have no doubt if we are to receive refugees from Ukraine they will be made so welcome.

I also this week have been saddened by the increasing levels of abuse my staff receive from the public as they go about their jobs.

None of my staff have been furloughed during the Pandemic and all have found their workloads have increased as they have struggled to meet the demands of our parks and open spaces being used more than they have ever been.

The lack of tolerance and abuse of some in society has, at times, become intolerable for my staff.

Their work at times is difficult and certainly, over the last couple of weeks, they have worked long hours supporting the flood efforts in the town.

Thankfully, these people are in the minority and many more residents do chat to them about their work, and I regularly receive lovely comments about how kind and helpful they have been.

They also make me proud to have staff who love what they do and genuinely want to make a difference.

All I ask is what is on my niece's sweatshirt "Be Kind".

Our world is a cruel place at times and we need to help each other and respect each other as much as we can.

SHREWSBURY MARKET HALL VOTED ONE OF BRITAIN'S FAVOURITE MARKETS

Shrewsbury Market Hall faced stiff make it happen, showing competition from markets across the country and has been named as runner up in Britain's Favourite Market for 2022.

The result was revealed at the National Association of British Market Authorities (NABMA) conference in Birmingham last month.

NABMA runs the Great British Market Awards each year and includes a category to find Britain's Favourite Market. With on-line public voting asking people to nominate their favourite market, the markets attracting the most votes were short-listed for the second round of the competition.

The Market Hall was also the subject of a visit from mystery shoppers as part of the judging process.

Helen Ball, town clerk, said: "We are thrilled that Shrewsbury Market Hall has been recognised as one of Britain's Favourite Markets, especially after the tough trading conditions of the last two years. The result bears great testimony to those who

outstanding customer service and a commitment to providing value for money."

Mike Cox, our outdoor recreation and asset manager, added: "We would like to congratulate Bury market for winning such a tough competition. Being in the Top Ten is an achievement in itself and being announced as Runner-up is such a fantastic result.

"The Market Hall has always done well in the national competition and that's down to the great combination of our Market Hall team. the traders and our wonderful customers.

"Over the last two years, it has been extremely difficult for everyone, but by adapting to the changing circumstances, and with the support from our customers and traders, we've managed to maintain a successful market, which continues to surprise our visitors both locally and from further afield."

The Market Hall is run jointly by Shropshire Council and Shrewsbury Town Council and they collectively pride themselves




on having 100% occupancy and a healthy waiting list.

With its contemporary architecture and the striking clock tower dominating the town's skyline, Shrewsbury Market Hall has been home to traders since 1965.

Selling everything from fruit and vegetables to meat & poultry, books, china, bikes, collectibles, arts and crafts, it is the place with much character and soul. The mix is so varied that the Market Hall is promoted as the only place you can buy your bird nuts right next to having champagne and ovsters.

Rob Miles, our market officer, said: "There has always been a bench in this area prior to the Coronavirus pandemic and Mike would sit and have light-hearted banter with fellow traders and customers.

"Sadly, Mike passed away in April 2020 and it was decided that once Covid-19 restrictions were eased and it was safer for people to sit and chat, a new bench would be installed and bear Mike's name."

Funds of around £320 were donated by members of the public, which have been put towards the total

cost of the new bench, which has been handcrafted by local wood worker, Chris Nangle.

Whilst Mike is no longer at the helm, his business continues to thrive as "Generations & Good Night Sweetheart" run by Olli, Mike's grandson, and Teri, his daughter, all under the watchful eye of Jean.

COUNTRYSIDE AND GREENSPACE TEAM UPDATE

Town Council Works on Ash Dieback Disease

Ash dieback is a fungal disease originating from Asia that is killing our native European ash trees in large numbers and is the most significant tree disease to affect the UK since Dutch elm disease in the 1960s and 1970s.

The disease has been present in the U.K from imported tree stock since the early 2000s, as well as by wind-blown spores from the continent. Symptoms include blackening leaves during summer, often at the tips of branches, discolouration and lesions on bark and eventually death.

Jim Goldsmith, our ranger in the Countryside and Greenspace Team, said: "Since 2020, we have surveyed our ash trees annually for signs of the disease and have recommended remedial works where necessary, including removal.

"As part of our Ash Dieback Policy, we replant up to three trees to replace any we remove. The trees have been chosen from a list identified by Forest Research to best replicate the ecosystem functions and species use of the lost ash and include oak, rowan, birch, aspen and field maple.

"We use large trees to allow the tree to establish

much quicker than a "whip" would.

And the replanting process also includes 3-5 years of after-care of the tree to encourage success."

Over the course of the winter, our Countryside staff have been busy planting replacement trees around the town, which are planted as near as possible to the tree that has been removed to promote continuation of habitat.

Matt Wilcoxon, our countryside and greenspace manager, added: "The benefits of Ash are numerous. They help to reduce pollution and flooding, regulate urban air temperature and also store carbon, as well as supporting many native species of wildlife.

"The loss of these trees will have a huge impact on the landscape of Shropshire and the habitats they support. Current evidence suggests at least 50% mortality of our park and street ash, with up to 85% rate of mortality expected in woodlands."

We are working to ensure that ash dieback disease is managed within the tree stock in the town to ensure that the recovery of local woodlands are protected for the future.

COUNTRYSIDE AND GREENSPACE TEAM UPDATE

Our Countryside and Greenspace team has been busy assisting local residents improve the pathways at their local nature reserve.

Residents using Copthorne Park felt that the paths were becoming too muddy during the winter months and needed refreshing for the benefit of people using the area.

Matt Wilcoxon, our countryside and greenspace manager, said; "We were recently contacted by users of Copthorne Park who kindly offered to spread woodchip along the paths to improve the muddy conditions. our tree safety works and it was moved in a couple of hours!

"We will be supplying more chip this week for the group to cover the other side of the park." Copthorne Park is a nature reserve in the west of Shrewsbury and is popular with dog walkers, joggers and anyone just wanting to enjoy a peaceful walk. Community involvement is encouraged, and the countryside unit's weekly volunteer party can often be found working at Copthorne Park.

"The local residents also value the park, and usually clear up any litter that appears within a few hours."

SOLAR LAMP INSTALLATION PROGRAMME IN THE QUARRY COMPLETED

Work has now been completed on the installation of solar lights in the Quarry park.

With a total of forty-one solar lights installed between Porthill Suspension Bridge and Grey Friars Bridge, the path along the River Severn will be illuminated throughout the night for people using the park.

Leader of the Town Council, Councillor Alan Mosley, said: "Safety along the river has been a high priority for us to ensure that everyone using the park at night can feel safer and more likely to use and enjoy the enhanced the feel of their park due to the solar lighting.

"I am delighted that the scheme has now been completed and I would like to thank our staff for all their hard work as we continue to implement our plans to improve amenities throughout the town.

"Already we have received a lot of very positive comments about this further lighting initiative. Alongside our conversion of footpath lights to LEDs, we are continuing towards our ambition to become carbon neutral well before 2030. We are also looking at all opportunities to use solar power in other operations across the Council."

Stuart Farmer, our projects manager, said: "It has been a great and challenging project to work on with both Zeta Specialist Lighting and Shrewsbury-based Potters Electrical Limited, and I believe we have produced an atmospheric, sensitive light source along the towpath without it being too bright for the Conservation Area.

"One of design specifications stipulated that the solar lights had to provide the necessary wattage to ensure the lights work throughout the year, and working with our contractors, we have achieved the desired result and they look really great."

NEW WILDLIFE IMPROVEMENTS FOR HERMITAGE GREEN

Wildlife in Coleham will be getting a helping hand from with new hibernation piles and bird boxes unveiled in a local park.

Our Countryside and Greenspace Team has been working with the residents of Belle Vue Ward to make improvements for wildlife in the area.

Councillor Kate Halliday, Ward member for Belle Vue, said: "A number of residents had approached me to help improve the facilities for this area of open space. We've worked with the Town Council's Countryside and Greenspace team to help with installing hibernation piles for hedgehogs and amphibians as well as nest boxes for bats and birds.

"We also realised that the park doesn't have an 'official' name and we've had a competition at Coleham Primary School, asking pupils to make suggestions and then vote on a name for our local open space. The pupils voted for Hermitage Green.

"We're pleased that the Town Council is backing our initiative, and will provide new signs for the park.

"The open space at South Hermitage is a well-used local facility and is an ideal location to help wildlife in the middle of an urban area. These new installations will not only help to improve the habitat for declining species but will also provide an excellent opportunity for people to learn more about the wildlife around them."

The improvements include several different types of nest boxes, including ones designed for house sparrows. Although these birds are still considered common, they have suffered a 60% decline in towns and cities since the 1970s. Matt Wilcoxon, our Countryside and Greenspace manager, added:

"A lack of suitable nest sites in modern buildings and a reduction in insects are just two of the problems sparrows face. Unlike other birds, they are happy to nest communally, so several boxes can be put up together.

"In addition, small log piles covered with soil, known as hibernacula, have been built around the edge of the park. These are vital for insects, mammals and amphibians to find cover during the winter. Hedgehogs are particularly fond of these and are another species in sharp decline.

"We have also included a strip of 'no mow' grass area along the tree line, which will enable long grasses and other plants to flower. This will give pollinators a chance to feed throughout the year and will also provide food for a host of other animals."

Zackary Black, aged 10 and a member of the Coleham Primary School Eco-council, said: "It's important to make our local park eco-friendly and more natural, to encourage wildlife and protect hedgehogs."

The Recreation Ground is situated off Raby Crescent and South Hermitage and is home to a play area and open space with football posts, owned and maintained by the Town Council.

BOGUS CALLERS



Always be aware of people who turn up arranged appointment.

Protect yourself from doorstep crime.

Follow our advice to reduce the risk of being scammed.

Doorstep crime can include rogue traders offering home improvement or gardening services, or bogus callers who claim to be the Council, Police, health carers or energy companies.

Pedlars with no pedlars certificate. A pedlar is someone who calls at your door to sell items that they have on offer. This often includes cleaning or household goods.

Bogus Callers may claim to be working for the unannounced. Most genuine callers will have a pre- Council, water, gas or electric company. They could also say they are a Nurse, Doctor or from the Police.

> They may say they need to come into your home, or try to get you to go outside.

Check their Identity.

Call the Company to check by using the number from the telephone directory.





E-SCOOTERS

E-scooters are becoming more popular and your child/grandchild may be asking for one as a present. Before buying one please consider the following.

What is an e-scooter?

Electrical scooters (also known as e-scooters) come under the category of "powered transporters". This also covers a range of other personal transport devices which are powered by a motor.

"Powered transporters" fall within the legal definition of a motor vehicle under the Road Traffic Act 1988. Therefore, the rules that apply to motor vehicles, also apply to e-scooters.

As a motor vehicle, they must comply with various pieces of Road Traffic Legislation, including but not limited to.

- driving with a licence
- driving/riding with insurance
- driving/riding other than on a road
- need to be taxed

It is not currently possible to get appropriate insurance for privately owned e-scooters, meaning it is illegal to use them on the road or in public spaces.





CHANGES TO THE HIGHWAY CODE

Part of the Highway code has changed with effect from **Saturday 29th January**

The changes are as follows:

- Cyclists have priority over cars when cars are turning,
- Pedestrians have priority over cars at junctions,
- Changes to cyclist positioning to ensure better visibility,

• The full updated version of <u>The Highway Code</u> is available, free of charge, on GOV.UK.

SAFETY ON THE RAILWAYS

British Transport Police are advising parents and guardians to ensure the children in their care do not play on the railway tracks.

Children have been seen playing 'chicken' in the Meole Brace area – this is extremely dangerous.

The crossing at Meole Brace is used by children in the area as part of their walk to school and should only be used for this purpose and in accordance with the rules in place.

Local British Transport Police, based at Shrewsbury Station, are asking parents and guardians to highlight the dangers of playing on the railway.

The legal implications of trespassing on the rail network could lead to a criminal record and a possible £1,000 fine.

British Transport Police have been active in local schools to address the issue of railway safety.
